




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Zhang Yaonua, a 2023 Ginkgo Fellow, rounded You & Me Companion, a technical support center dedicated to sexuality education for children and adolescents aged 6-18, with a particular focus on increasing access to sexuality education for vulnerable groups, including children living in economically underdeveloped regions, and youth with disabilities. The program has reached over 4,000 primary and secondary schools, benefiting over 5 million children and adolescents.



Yang Qingfeng, a 2024 Ginkgo Fellow, founded the "Golden Cane" independent living brand for visually impaired people. Targeting visually impaired individuals such as college students, individuals with acquired blindness, and young adults, the organization offers empowerment programs featuring "peer companionship." These programs support visually impaired individuals in enhancing their independent mobility, improving their quality of life and employment prospects, and promoting equal development opportunities.




Bayartu, a 2013 Ginkgo Fellow, established the West Ujimqin Banner Pastoral Area Information Service Center, which has long supported the development of pastoral specialized cooperatives. In recent years, he has worked actively with herder communities to address climate change risks, implementing initiatives like "Fodder Banks" and "Air Grassland" to mitigate the impact of extreme weather events such as snowstorms and cold waves on herders' livelihoods.



Tian Qian, a 2023 Ginkgo Fellow, is in charge of the Zero Waste Public Welfare Development Center. The center has created an platform for innovative exploration and cooperation in terms of waste reduction and waste sorting. It is committed to facilitating communication and collaboration among various sectors in the waster management process, including government, businesses, academic institutions, the public, and social organizations, to drive the positive development of waste management systems, circular economy and low-carbon economy in China.

Beyond the Cross-Border Leadership Project, Ginkgo has been exploring new ways to improve the international exchange between Chinese social entrepreneurs and their global counterparts. Early in 2025, thanks to the generous support of Li Foundation, an inaugural group of Ginkgo Fellows embarked on an intensive 6-day study tour to Singapore, which provided the Ginkgo Fellows with first-hand exposure to Singapore's philanthropic ecosystem, innovative funding models, and social impact. The participating Fellows also shared their experience from China, making this journey a truly fruitful two-way exchange.

Preface

At the close of 2024, the Ginkgo Foundation conducted its third annual survey on the needs of social entrepreneurs, engaging over a hundred leaders working in the public interest sector. The survey results suggest an improvement in the evaluation of the overall external environment compared to the previous year; however, the perception of the fundraising environment remains challenging. Regarding personal growth and career development needs, social entrepreneurs expressed the strongest needs for more effective business development and organizational operation, alongside intrinsic growth desires such as bolstering courage and gaining a broader understanding of the environment and emerging trends. Notably, beyond their individual development aspirations, an increasing number of social entrepreneurs are prioritizing growth support for their team members. Unsurprisingly, the need for funding remains prominent – with a desire for more patient, flexible, and trust-based financial support.

Ginkgo Foundation's enduring commitment to research on the needs of public interest talent stems from our recognition of the inherent value of adopting a "needs-based perspective." We believe that only through a genuine understanding of the real circumstances and development aspirations of public interest practitioners, and by accurately aligning these needs with appropriate support resources, can we effectively promote the systemic resolution of social problems and contribute to sound social development through investing in people.

In the second year of the implementation of our strategic plan, alongside the continuous optimization of the "Ginkgo Fellow Program," we further developed the Program on Expanding Outreach to Support More Public Interest Talent. Through these initiatives, we have provided direct support to over 100 Ginkgo Fellows, 105 public interest leaders from diverse regions and issue areas, as well as more than 500 public interest practitioners.

Ginkgo always firmly believes that strategic investment in individuals with leadership potential can generate a multiplier effect. When the leadership potential of these practitioners is fully activated, and their personal leadership, organizational influence, and social leadership resonate, it will significantly enhance the effectiveness of social problem-solving and propels the overall development of the sector – this is precisely the leverage value of a "people-centered" investment strategy.

Over the past year, Ginkgo has joined hands with a number of partner organizations in the public interest sector to jointly advocate for "investing in people," and developed the following propositions for talent investment:

Facing a period of challenges that may persist for years to come, Ginkgo will continue to provide certainty to the public interest sector in uncertain times. We will do our utmost to ensure that the most valuable group of young and middle-aged talent in the public interest sector in China do not easily lose their way, and to safeguard our shared core values, beliefs, and sense of hope. In this long-term endeavor, we continue to seek more fellow travelers to join us in empowering more promising public interest talent with hope and sustained action, and altogether uphold and enhance the resilience of our society.

As a grantmaking foundation dedicated to supporting the growth and development of key talent in the public interest sector, Ginkgo Foundation directly addresses and actively works to resolve critical challenges facing sector professionals. Now at the midpoint of our three-year strategic plan (2023-2025), aligned with the strategic goal of retaining and developing key talent in the public interest sector while enhancing Ginkgo's public value, we have established three core operational pillars, namely Deepening Support (targeting 161 Ginkgo Fellows), Expanding Outreach (targeting a broader range of key public interest talent), and Advocacy & Collaboration (targeting the public interest sector as a whole).


The Ginkgo Fellow Program continues to evolve and upgrade, developing into a support system that effectively responds to social entrepreneurs' growth trajectories and meets their key needs. It helps social entrepreneurs maintain their entrepreneurial drive and pioneering spirit while grounded in stable values and autonomy, encourages collaborative solutions to social problems, expands the boundaries of their actions, and develops broader perspectives, greater impact, and enhanced leadership.

Expanding outreach

By targeting key talent across more regions and issue areas, we support hub organizations in building tailored support systems for local/issue-specific talent, while funding these talent development initiatives. This approach helps retain and develop the sector's most promising professionals. While addressing the "pain points" of the public interest sector, it also contributes to the development of regional/issue-based ecosystems, and fosters collaborative efforts with more funders to support talent in the sector.

Public Value Ginkgo not only shares its methodologies and resources with the public interest sector, but also consistently advocates for "investing in people" across the sector. We support exchanges, knowledge dissemination, research initiatives, and active policy engagement focused on talent development for public interest sector. By promoting the more effective cultivation and leveraging of the core value inherent in human capital, we work towards contributing to building critical infrastructure for the public interest sector, and advancing its overall development.

03 | Ginkgo Fellow Program

Ginkgo Fellow Program (hereinafter referred to as the "Ginkgo Program") stands as the flagship initiative of Ginkgo Foundation, dedicated to identifying and supporting young change-makers who embody the spirit of social entrepreneurship. These individuals demonstrate influential and leading roles either in the broader public interest sector or in specific fields, effectively addressing social problems while safeguarding and advancing the core values and strategic direction of the sector.

As of the end of 2024, there are 161 Ginkgo Fellows spanning 28 provincial-level regions across China, deeply engaged in 14 issue areas and contributing to all 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).


Seeking out Promising Social Entrepreneurs

As a project focused on investing in people, the Ginkgo Program, in its search for social entrepreneurs, emphasizes the inherent qualities of the candidates as individuals and the development potential of the causes to which they are dedicated.

As the primary leaders of their initiatives, social entrepreneurs shall possess these fundamental qualities: driven by mission, self-motivated, problem-aware, collaborative, change-oriented.



Meanwhile, these social entrepreneurs have already explored and formulated initial solutions to the specific social problems they are focusing on. However, in the course of their continued action, they may encounter developmental constraints that require external assistance and support. Ginkgo's core approach to seeking out social entrepreneurs is "matching," while maintaining an open stance with no restrictions regarding the candidates' upper age limit, gender, organization type, geographic location, nationality, or organizational form.



In 2024, 151 candidates were considered within the scope of the Ginkgo Fellow recruitment assessment. After a six-month recruitment process, a total of 8 social entrepreneurs were selected as the 2024 Ginkgo Fellows. Over the next three years, they will receive systematic support including unrestricted funding, companionship and support, a specialized funding system, and access to the Ginkgo Fellow community.

// Empowering Social Entrepreneurs to Achieve Personal Growth and Breakthroughs

Social entrepreneurs need to lead their ventures forward and achieve breakthroughs under pressure. Sustainable personal development thus forms the foundation for effective social problem-solving. Ginkgo responds to key needs through both monetary and non-monetary support programs, assisting Ginkgo Fellows who are facing bottlenecks to stabilize their personal well-being, and helping those at critical stages to achieve significant progress.

2024 Highlights:

26 Ginkgo Fellows

participated in the Ginkgo Pro Bono Coaching Program and received year-round one-on-one guidances from professional coaches, gaining support in their personal well-being, growth objectives, and career direction.

5 Ginkgo Fellows

took part in the Effective Personal Leadership (EPL) Program, and clarified their mission and values while strengthening their sense of purpose and confidence in their ventures.

5 Ginkgo Fellows

received Breakthrough Scholarship, which enabled them to pursue various academic programs and systematic capacity-building courses.

// Supporting Social Entrepreneurs in Effective Organizational Development

Findings from Ginkgo Fellows' needs assessment highlight organizational struggles as a major impediment to the long-term effectiveness of social entrepreneurs in tackling social issues. Their crucial needs encompass areas such as "organizational change", "support for my team", and "talent recruitment, cultivation, utilization, and retention."

In response to these key demands, Ginkgo meticulously curates professional third-party services and provides financial support to Ginkgo Fellows accessing them. This approach aims to discover effective strategies for enhancing the organizational capabilities of "top leaders" in the public interest sector.

At Ginkgo Foundation, we believe that social entrepreneurs are capable of more than just operational success and business growth. They should also exhibit leadership and initiative that transcend organizational boundaries in tackling social challenges and fostering sector advancement. Through its experimental funding initiative in 2024, the Ginkgo Fellow Program continued its experimental funding initiatives to support social entrepreneurs in taking on leading roles in addressing urgent crises, collaboratively addressing social problems, and expanding their sphere of action.

·Supporting Social Entrepreneurs in Collaboratively Addressing Social Problems

Through trust-based and flexible funding, we support social entrepreneurs represented by Ginkgo Fellows, to unite networks, organizations, and individuals across organizations, fields, and even sectors, in order to foster consensus on social problems and explore pathways for collaborative action.

As of the end of 2024, Ginkgo Foundation had funded a total of 7 experimental collaborative projects, involving a total of 16 organizations and individuals taking part in the collaborative actions. The issues addressed include environment, plastic pollution, waste sorting, mental health of adolescents, elderly care, social inclusion, and the construction of issue networks.

Participation in the Cross-Organizational Collaboration Project on Plastic Strategy has deepened my understanding of the critical importance of collaborative cooperation. This approach allows for the full integration of strengths of diverse organizations, dismantling barriers and facilitating the sharing of resources and specialized knowledge. Within the project, each member's expertise contributes to a holistic analysis of the plastic issue, encompassing everything from raw materials to end-of-life management, leading to a more profound understanding of its complexities. Our collaboration has already yielded significant interim results, including the completion of high-quality strategic documents and the engagement of over 20 public interest partners, fostering a robust foundation of cooperation and mutual trust. In terms of tackling plastic pollution, we have successfully promoted industry-wide reduction efforts and implemented empowerment programs to strengthen our partners' capabilities. We are committed to deepening this collaborative spirit as we continue our persistent efforts to solve the pressing issue of plastic pollution."

• Ginkgo Climate Fellow Program: Supporting Social Entrepreneurs to Expand Their Sphere of Action to Address Major Social Challenges

Confronting the critical social issue of climate change, the Ginkgo Foundation actively supports social entrepreneurs and their organizations in developing and implementing solutions. Our goal is to unlock their potential for climate action, explore avenues for climate engagement in multifaceted areas, and facilitate the effective deployment of impactful solutions.

As of the close of 2024, the Ginkgo Foundation had provided funding to 15 projects across 14 organizations, operating in 8 provinces including Inner Mongolia, Jilin, Anhui, Yunnan, and Hainan. These projects tackle climate vulnerabilities in animal husbandry, agriculture, aquaculture, fisheries, urban migrant communities, urban elderly communities, and rural populations. Our support also extends to pioneering initiatives in climate giving circle and climate theater.



Entirely reliant on the weather, herdsmen see the health of their cattle and sheep drastically affected by climate stability. Rich pastures naturally sustain thriving livestock. Yet, recent years have been marked by recurring droughts spanning spring, summer, and autumn, followed by debilitating winter blizzards and intense cold. This extreme weather not only poses the threat of livestock freezing to death, but, more significantly, results in widespread undernourishment and poor nutrition, leading to weak and unhealthy animals. Consequently, herders are compelled to purchase costly licorice root to supplement their feed. Recognizing these challenges, Ginkgo Climate Fellows Bayartu and Narengowa are pioneering diverse strategies for climate change adaptation in pastoral communities.

Ginkgo Fellows Community: A Space for Peer Support and Public Life

The Ginkgo Fellows Community is a space where social entrepreneurs embody the spirit of collaboration. Here, they find peer companionship and support, engage in meaningful public life that extends beyond organizational and thematic boundaries, and experiment with network leadership to achieve joint impact. Ginkgo Foundation consistently supports this innovative, volunteer-based endeavor, aiming to generate stronger bonds and collaborations among the Fellows.



In March 2024, the Ginkgo Fellows Community Spring Gathering, themed "Small Streams Gathered into a River, Hundreds of Rivers Flowing into the Sea," brought together more than 70 Ginkgo Fellows in Huangshan, Anhui Province. Ginkgo Fellows planted ginkgo trees together, creating timeless memories unique to their fellowship. Wang Haichen (2015 Ginkgo Fellow) from Harbin Jiaren Public Welfare Service Development Center shared, "Planting ginkgo trees together felt truly remarkable—like bearing witness to our collective journey, and a source of strength for fellow partners moving forward. Holding fast to the core values of public welfare amid the storm speaks volumes about the uncertainties of our current environment. Although each of us faces our own struggles, the inner spark remains vibrant, and the community's power lies in mutual support and trust."



The Cooperation Fund empowers Fellows to initiate joint actions and explore various avenues for collective impact. The long-term development of the community is inseparable from the voluntary services and collective efforts of Ginkgo Fellows.



In January 2024, the Ginkgo Fellows Community Joint Meeting was held in Beijing. The Ginkgo Fellows Community Working Group discussed and reached consensus on topics such as the 2024 Ginkgo Fellows Community goals, the working objectives of each working group, how to collaborate and support each other, how to activate the community, as well as how to strengthen connections among Fellows.

Sun Haiyan (2015 Ginkgo Fellow) from Business Ecology is a member of the 3rd Ginkgo Fellows Covenant Working Group. Sharing her experience participating in the community work, she said, "[At the activity of Covenant Working Group, I] met old friends, exchanged ideas, and got to know new Fellows. The Ginkgo Covenant has received more attention and participation within the community. The late-night talks with the Covenant Working Group members made me feel very secure. Having fellow travelers who understand each other in times of difficulty is a great source of spiritual support."

Expanding Outreach: Supporting More Public Interest Talent

Regional and Issue-based Talent Support Program:
Retaining and Fostering More Talents in the Public Interest Sector

The past decade has seen a significant rise in local and frontline public interest organizations and entrepreneurial practitioners tackling fundamental social needs. However, they often face challenges regarding operational space, resource acquisition, professional advancement, and personal growth. While projects and specific issues may attract substantial funding, the crucial individuals driving them frequently lack recognition and development support, underscoring a need for visibility and systematic investment in the people. Although certain regional and issue areabased organizations are willing to provide assistance, their capacity is often quite constrained.

Recognizing this critical situation, the Ginkgo Foundation provides financial and technical support to empower regional and issue-based hub organizations to implement their own initiatives addressing talent development. Adopting a demand-responsive strategy, we direct key resources towards nurturing crucial public interest talent. As of the end of 2024, these talent development projects supported by Ginkgo have collectively benefited 105 professionals working across three issue areas (disability inclusion, migrant populations, and nature education) and in three regions (Yunnan Province, Fujian Province, and the Pearl River Delta Region). Besides, Ginkgo Foundation also provides financial support and accompaniment for willing hub organizations to conduct needs assessments and identify the specific needs of key talents, thereby enabling tailored design and effective implementation of the support projects.

Qingyun Fellows: A Peer Support Program for Key Public Interest Talent in Yunnan Province

"Since 2016, Yunnan Lianxin has deeply engaged with over 150 Yunnan public interest professionals through various training programs. We've keenly observed common needs among leaders of county-level social organizations in Yunnan: developing core and frontline staff, synthesizing project experience and upgrading initiatives, overcoming isolation, strengthening identity recognition, and diversifying funding streams.

In 2024, we launched the "Qingyun Fellows – a peer support program for key public interest talent in Yunnan Province" to support Yunnan public interest professionals with initial aspirations and a strong sense of mission, insights and action in specific areas, a strong learning drive, and a commitment to regional ecosystem development. Our hope is that Qingyun Fellows will not only progress more steadily but also catalyze the regional ecosystem by fostering issue networks, resource connections, and sector exchange. With our first-year support, four Qingyun Fellows have gained self-awareness, broadened their perspectives, responded calmly to organizational and external changes, and moved forward with greater solidarity. For Yunnan Lianxin, this marks our first systematic and comprehensive people-centric support initiative, exploring the nuances of supporting individuals versus organizations, with both successes and challenges. For the sector, as Yunnan's first local, grassroots-supported public interest talent project centered on "investing in people," it has garnered increasing attention. We look forward to mobilizing more resources to support public interest professionals, enabling their continued growth with greater confidence and resolve."

Breaking the Cocoon: Public Interest Talent Development Initiative in the Field of Disability

"The disability rights movement has long advocated, 'Nothing about us without us.' This raises the crucial questions of how people with disabilities can meaningfully participate in matters concerning them and how they can transition from being passive recipients of aid to active decision-makers. The current landscape of disability development faces significant challenges, including the prioritization of individual efforts over collective action, private interests overshadowing public good, and a lack of emerging leadership. Supporting greater involvement of people with disabilities in public interest work and fostering their self-determination is therefore urgently needed.

The ongoing project addresses two primary needs expressed by people with disabilities: first, a sense of belonging, the shift from "me" to "us." Isolated individuals with disabilities are easily overwhelmed by inaccessible environments; solidarity is essential to affirm shared courage, experience, and strength. Second, the need for their experiences and wisdom to be valued. People with disabilities have the ability to participate in, decide on, and implement solutions to their own disability-related issues, and they require appropriate support and encouragement.

Over the past year, the "Breaking the Cocoon" – Public Interest Talent Development Initiative in the Disability Field – has empowered over 100 individuals with disabilities to gain a deeper intellectual understanding of their self-determination. Sixty participants have developed a stronger emotional connection to the disability community and a greater acceptance of their disability identity. Nearly 30 individuals have begun to approach disability issues with a research-oriented perspective and value their lived experiences. Importantly, a growing number of people with disabilities now recognize that their participation extends beyond media advocacy to encompass knowledge acquisition, mutual support, problem investigation, and solution development."



Experimental Funding: Boosting the Talent Pool for the Public Interest Sector

Recognizing the need to attract more individuals to the public interest sector and foster a positive movement of talent, Ginkgo Foundation initiated an experimental funding program to expand its talent pool in late 2023. This program seeks to empower the sector to explore innovative ways to increase the number of public interest professionals by providing sustained and adaptable funding. The objective is to enable individuals from diverse age groups and professional backgrounds to learn about and engage with public interest work via varied means, thereby potentially leading to their long-term commitment to public interest action and their emergence as valuable public interest talent.

To address significant and diverse unmet needs of public interest talent, and to ensure a high-quality and sustainable talent pool for more effective social problem-solving, greater funder engagement in talent investment is crucial.

Accordingly, Ginkgo not only directly invests in public interest talent, but also actively promotes the investing in people approach within the sector. We offer solutions and advice, and work closely with partners in order to cultivate an ecosystem that prioritizes talent development.

Advocating for "Investing in People"

// What are we talking about, when we talk about "investing in people"

- "People" refers to practitioners in the public interest sector. More specifically, it refers to the sustainable growth and development of professionals and volunteers in the public interest sectors who are committed to solving social problems and promoting positive social development for the public good.
- "Investing" concerns financial resources, but is not limited to that. It also includes but is not limited to the input of funds, opportunities, information, attention, companionship, and other material and non-material resources, with which positive outcomes are expected to be achieved in 5 to 10 years or even longer.

Every public interest professional can cultivate their own support system for growth and Leaders of any public interest organization should prioritize investment in the Our growth and development of their employees. **Propositions** Hub organizations are well-positioned to take a leading role in supporting key talent in their specific region or issue area. The sustained positive advancement of the public interest sector necessitates increased

investment in its people from a wider range of funders.

// Sharing Ginkgo's Experience

As the flagship program of the Ginkgo Foundation, the Ginkgo Fellow Program has been running for 14 years since its launch in 2010. In 2024, Ginkgo Foundation collaborated with the Beijing Qiyue Social Welfare Service Center to develop the Evaluation Report on the Project Model of the Ginkgo Fellow Program, in an attempt to answer the questions of "whether the Program is effective, how it is effective, and how it can be more effective." While supporting the updating and iteration of the Ginkgo Fellow Program, this Report is also expected to provide useful references for sector partners, including practitioners and funders, with Ginkgo's approach, experience, and reflections on "investing in people."

Co-creating a Discussion Space for "Investing in People" in the Public Interest Sector

In April 2024, Ginkgo Foundation partnered with the China Donors Roundtable (CDR) to host a thematic workshop on "Investing in People" at the CDR Annual Meeting. The workshop was participated by 30 representatives from grantmaking organizations, who shared their insights and engaged in discussions. In November, Ginkgo Foundation, in collaboration with Yuexiang Xinzhi, Xinhe Foundation, and Qianhe Community Foundation, hosted a parallel forum at the China Foundation Development Forum 2024 Annual Meeting with the theme of "Unlocking the Imagination of 'Investing in People', Creating 5% Change."

The parallel forum attracted over 60 participants from across the country, including frontline public welfare practitioners, grantmakers, and scholars. Starting from the significance and value of "investing in people," the forum initiated eight parallel dialogues from the perspectives of both the demand and supply sides of "the growth and development of talent in the public interest sector," across the individual, organizational, and sectoral dimensions, conveying the propositions of "investing in people."

一、审计意见

三、管理层和治理层对财务报表的责任
